Subject: Please focus on PBM reform

To the Members of the Prescription Drug Affordability Board,

I urge you to think carefully about the real consequences of mandating the costs of prescription medications.

I've seen how fragile access to medicines can be when insurance companies and PBMs stand in the way. If the Board truly wants to lower costs without harming access, the focus should be on reining in PBMs, not discouraging the development of future treatments.

At your upcoming meeting, I ask that you keep patients in mind. This decision is not just about budgets; it's about lives, dignity, and the chance for families to move forward.
